Ms. Jimena indicated that she was part of a free pop up boutique, which provided resources needed for those affected by the first.

Ms. Forrester indicated that LACOE is doing a series of workshops on Know Your Rights. She said she would like to receive updates on the Weekly Board Memo on what is going on with Know Your Rights.

Dr. Montano wanted to know how broadly did we share Board Resolution No. 32. Where are we seeing practices that are contrary to the Board Resolution? Would like to see something done with Board Resolution.

Mr. Cross mentioned the fires and encouraged everyone to participate and assist with resources.

Dr. Duardo, Superintendent, provided the following highlights to the County Board:

FIRE RESPONSE EFFORTS

- Current Situation Overview:
 - Pasadena USD faces significant challenges due to wildfires, with many employees and schools affected.
- Actions Taken for Affected Districts:
 - Los Angeles Unified School District (LAUSD):
 - Temporarily relocated 7 schools from evacuation zones:
 - Topanga Elementary to Woodland Hills Academy
 - Canyon Charter Elementary to Brockton Elementary
 - Kenter Canyon Elementary to Emerson Middle School
 - Lanai Road Elementary to Portola Middle School
 - Roscomare Road Elementary to Warner Elementary School
 - Community Charter Magnet to Westwood Elementary School
 - Paul Revere Middle to University High School Charter
 - Malibu USD:
 - Closed schools on Tuesday, January 21.
 - Pasadena USD:
 - Reopening schools in phases, aiming for full in-person learning by the end of January.
 - 10 schools and programs set to open on January 23, including:
 - Hamilton Elementary, Willard Elementary & Children's Center, Blair Middle & High School, San Rafael Elementary, McKinley School, Rose City High School, Center for Independent Study, Pasadena Adult Living Skills, Twilight Adult School, Aveson Global Leadership Academy.

- Impact on IPoly and LACHSA:
 - Both IPoly and LACHSA communities significantly affected by wildfires.
 - Several staff and families have lost homes or gone through the evacuation process.
 - The school community has come together to offer support.
 - Proactive outreach by IPoly and LACHSA to families and staff in affected areas, providing assistance and support from the beginning.
 - Support from the Associated Student Bodies, LACHSA Parent Association Board, IPoly PTSA, Greater LA Foundation, and LACHSA Foundation.
 - Overwhelming community generosity through donations of clothing, food, supplies, monetary contributions, and emotional support.
 - Acknowledgement of efforts from facilities teams and administrators in ensuring safe and healthy environments, including monitoring air quality, providing N95 masks, and maintaining HVAC systems.
- Recent Actions Taken:
 - Met with Pasadena USD leadership to understand their needs.
 - Identified areas for LACOE support:
 - Mental health and crisis counseling.
 - Housing resources for displaced employees and students.
 - Technology support for continuity of learning.
 - Advocacy for state-level flexibilities on testing and deadlines.
 - Facilities planning for temporary classrooms.
- Countywide Coordination:
 - Held a call with superintendents and charter school leaders for updates and urgent Q&A.
 - Provided air quality and filtration update by Dr. Barbara Ferrer.
- GLAEF Wildfire Recovery Fund:
 - Launched to support affected students, families, and educators.
 - Secured \$650,000 in donations and \$325,000 in in-kind support.

The Appeal was not granted, and the expulsion was upheld.

LACOE's Commitment

LACOE is reaffirming its commitment to enhance the educational and social outcomes of students who are part of the juvenile-justice system.





LA County Fires

Facility Operations: Los Padrinos remained open daily during the LA County fires.

Staff Impact: Four staff members were directly impacted and had to evacuate their homes due to the fires.

Student Engagement: Students watched the events unfold on CNN Student News and participated in discussions about the fires' impact on the community.

Health Concerns: Some students requested masks due to concerns about air quality.

Community Concerns: Students, particularly those with families living in the valley, voiced concerns about the fires, though no families reported being directly impacted.

Threat of Closure

Los Padrinos is facing the potential threat of closure, raising concerns among staff

- Newer Staff Concerns: Newer staff members have expressed anxiety about job security amid the uncertainty.
- Experienced Staff Reaction: Tenured staff, having experienced a similar situation during the closures of Central and part of Barry J. Nidorf, have not voiced significant concerns.
- **Probation Staffing Ratios**: Probation leadership is confident that staffing ratio requirements will be met, and operations are continuing as usual.
- Court Proceedings: Probation regularly attends court proceedings to uphold its legal authorization to operate. The next court date is February 14th and Probation has requested a re-inspection from BSCC.

<u>Academic Gaps</u> Many students have inconsistent educational experiences due to instability, transiency, chronic absenteeism, or prior suspensions/expulsions.

Special Needs

(74) A significant percentage of students have IEPs or 504 Plans due to learning disabilities, emotional disturbances, or other special needs.

Reading and Math Levels

Often below grade level with significant gaps in foundational skills.

Behavioral/Emotional Characteristics

Trauma History

Many students have experienced adverse childhood experiences (such as abuse, neglect, exposure to violence, or family substance abuse).

Mental Health Needs

High prevalence of anxiety, depression, PTSD, or undiagnosed conditions requiring clinical intervention.

Behavioral Challenges

Difficulty with self-regulation, impulse control, or interpersonal relationships, often stemming from unaddressed trauma.

Social and Economic Context

Poverty and Instability Most students come from lowincome households and may have faced housing instability.

Family Dynamics

Some students have strong family support, while others lack consistent caregivers or are in the foster care system.

Community Factors

Often from communities disproportionately impacted by systemic racism, gang activity, or limited access to quality healthcare and education.

A. Approval of Nominees for the School Attendance Review Board (SARB)

Administrative Regulation (AR) 5113.1 authorizes the County Board to appoint the members of the County School Attendance Review Board (SARB).

The Superintendent recommends that the County Board appoint the members of the County SARB as nominated.

The following page lists the nominees for service on the County School Attendance Review Board (SARB) as established by Education Code Section 48321. The Local District SARB is designed to address issues such as chronic absenteeism, truancy, and student behavior, while providing access to support services and resources that mitigate barriers to student success. In collaboration with local districts, the County SARB offers consultation, training and technical assistance to ensure the implementation of systems that promote the wellbeing and engagement of students and their families. As a community of practice, County SARB members work with the 53 local SARBs to encourage: 1) the formation of a diverse SARB panel, 2) the inclusion of student and parent perspectives and 3) the development of community partnerships.

The County SARB, under the Division of Student Support Services, offers biannual SARB Certification training for Attendance Supervisors. This event provides participants with the opportunity to obtain certification as local SARB Chairs and panel members. Additionally, a virtual refresher course is available for those who are already SARB-certified or for individuals seeking to expand their knowledge.

School district representatives are nominated by their respective school district governing boards and appointed by the county superintendent, and their names are included for the Board's information as noted by an asterisk (*).

A. Approval of LACOE Legislative Proposal: Position Recommendation Report (PRR), February 2025

The Superintendent recommends that the County Board approve the following legislative proposal for the 2025 Legislative Year:

1. Reforming Mandated Reporting through the Mandated Supporting Initiative (MSI) Pilot

<u>Desired Outcome</u>: Funding to pilot the Mandated Supporting Initiative (MSI) model in Los Angeles County, with the goal of reforming mandated reporting practices to improve equity, enhance child safety, and support family well-being.

<u>Summary of the Issue</u>: Mandated reporters are responsible for reporting suspected child abuse and neglect to the Department of Children and Family Services (DCFS). However, the current system is plagued by inadequate training, confusion over legal mandates, and bias-driven decisions. This leads to both overreporting, particularly of Black families, who are disproportionately represented in the child welfare system, and underreporting of genuinely unsafe situations.

Overreporting burdens families with unnecessary DCFS interventions, while underreporting leaves at-risk children vulnerable. Mandated reporting as it stands is a reactive system, lacking proactive measures to support families before harm occurs. These deficiencies demonstrate the urgent need for systemic reform.

Proposed Pilot and MSI Model

The MSI seeks to amend the California Penal Code (Section § 11166.03) to establish a two-year pilot program in Los Angeles County starting January 1, 2026, and concluding January 1, 2028. Participating organizations would implement the MSI model, which consists of four key components:

1. **Training:** Development and dissemination of a comprehensive MSI Mandated Reporter Training program, equipping reporters with knowledge and tools for accurate and equitable decisions.

- 2. **Decision Tree Tool:** Deployment of an internet-based MSI Decision Tree to guide mandated reporters in their decision-making process.
- 3. **Resource Referrals:** Provision of access to local supportive services for families in need, as an alternative to DCFS intervention when appropriate.
- 4. **Program Evaluation:** Design and implementation of an evaluation framework to measure the pilot's impact and effectiveness.

Under the MSI model, mandated reporters follow the Decision Tree to determine the most appropriate action:

- Make a report to DCFS.
- Consult with DCFS or a designated entity for additional guidance.
- Provide a referral to community-based services.
- Take no further action if no report is required.

Mandated reporters who complete the training and act per the Decision Tree will satisfy statutory duties without fear of legal or professional liability, fostering a culture of support and informed decision-making.

The MSI model aligns with the following objectives:

- Reducing racial disproportionality in child welfare interventions.
- Preventing harm to children and strengthening family systems through upstream, supportive services.
- Ensuring consistent and equitable mandated reporting practices.

By funding and authorizing this pilot, California can lead the nation in pioneering a proactive, family-centered approach to child welfare that prioritizes child safety while minimizing unnecessary interventions.
